## Huffy's "Top Ten" Fire Safety Messages



#10. Keep your home and work area clean! Trash and clutter are fire hazards, and block your way out in an emergency! \* Check your electrical outlets! Make sure there are not too many things plugged in. Use the proper size cords that are not cracked or frayed, and that are U.L. approved.

#9. Big fires start small! Matches and Lighters are tools not toys. Never play with fire! If you see matches, or lighters lying around, tell an adult! Fire can get out of control in seconds!

#8. Stop, Drop, and Roll if your cloths catch of fire. Fire travels up, so drop down and roll to help put the fire out. \* Cool the Burn with water. If you have a burn, cool it with water. If it blisters have an adult, or Dr. check it.

#7. Maintain Clean and Replace your House Numbers. We have to find you in bad weather, and in all hours of the day and night. If you live in an apartment, talk to your manager about your building and apartment numbers. Help us find you in an emergency.

#6. Fire won't wait plan your escape! Pre-Plan and Practice Exit drills in your home! You can't hide from smoke or fire. Stay low, plan two ways out of each room, have a meeting spot outside, never go back in, and call 911 from next door.

#4. Always crawl low under smoke, and get out fast!  
Smoke has poison gasses in it. If you breathe it, it will make you weak and then pass out! Smoke rises so the freshest air will be down low next to the floor. Get out and stay out!

#4. Smoke Detectors – Don't stay home without one! Buy, Install, Keep Clean and Replace when needed. Check it monthly. Change the battery twice annually. A smoke detector is reliable for 8 to 10 years! after that - replace it with a new one. It can save your whole families life!

#3. For EMERGENCY calls punch in 911 for help! This is for the Fire Dept., Police Dept., Ambulance, Lake Patrol, or Sheriff. Stay calm, remember your name, address, & what emergency.

#2. Use Candles With Care! Candles may look nice, but they're a growing fire threat in our communities. Knowing the facts about candles is a key to fire safety. That is why the NFPA chose "Use Candles with Care" as the theme for Fire Prevention Week 2005.
